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Stepping into an APL classroom, you might see kindergarteners working together to count items for their Fall Stew recipes. You may hear third graders discussing different strategies to pack thousands of Pokemon cards into boxes. In a fourth-grade classroom, students might be creating fraction number lines based on their own experiences and interests. In each of these scenarios, teachers have pulled together the foundational APL elements- the practices, pillars, 6Cs and the Who of learning- to create classroom environments that invite students to be active participants in their own learning. During the 2024-25 school year, teachers reported that APL lessons increased student engagement, helped learners understand the targeted math concepts, and made learning fun.
